

19 MAY 2013: THE FEAST OF PENTECOST

THE WIND BLOWETH WHERE IT LISTETH...

At a wedding reception in Berkshire on Friday afternoon three people to whom I spoke lavished praise on the church service earlier in the day while quickly declaring themselves to be non-churchgoers. "I'm spiritual but not religious," seemed to be the recurring theme.

Poll after poll suggests that one observable trend in our day is that though active commitment to organised religion is

commitment to organised diminishing in the West, people's sense of 'spirituality' is alive and well, creating where people do come along – a gulf in the life of the Church between, on the one hand 'spirituality' and on the other 'belief.' Which comes first? Some 'experience' of the spiritual realm or that framework of agreed understanding about the economy of God and his action in Christ, 'doctrine,' and to which should we give priority?

Our age is at once both 'touchy-feely' and very syncretistic. Kabbalah is fashionable and may be interesting (Madonna certainly thinks so!). Eastern mysticism may delight your desires for the exotic and esoteric. And if your taste is for the native and the home-grown, there is no end of spiritual writing ostensibly derived from the Celtic tradition. Light a scented candle, dim the lights, cradle that pebble and open your heart and mind... It can be soothing, even powerful – but where is the point of connection with what goes on in church?

In our post-modern world many 'believe (something or other) without belonging (to the Church).' And many in the pews 'belong

without believing'... which is to say many people, through the strong communitarian or experience of aesthetic worship fellowship in places like St Paul's Knightsbridge or Cathedrals and Abbeys, 'sense God's presence but can't quite buy-in to the rest of the package.' They are enquirers, seekers. Many others in the Christian community – card-carrying believers

> simply write off 'spirituality' and 'religious experience' in all its forms as obfuscating and ultimately unnecessary.

> Where, I wonder, are you in all of this?

Perhaps instead of railing spirituality, against the churches should harness it. At this season of Pentecost, it is good to pause and to ponder that - and the Spirit of God 'blowing where it wills.' Clearly much of what passes as 'spirituality' in our post-

modern world is ultimately a distraction. But much of it may not be – and may well be one of the vehicles through which God speaks to Those who are suspicious of our age. 'alternative spirituality' would do well to open their hearts and minds to that possibility. And those who have a predisposition to the 'touchy-feely' would do well to remain alert to the possibility that not all spirituality is necessarily godly. And those who 'belong without believing'? They should perhaps always remember that in Christ we are called from discerning the touch of the Spirit to real discipleship and an active following after Christ.


PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

"The world into which St. Benedict was born was a troubled, torn apart, uncertain world. It knew little of safety or of security, and the church was almost as troubled as the secular powers. It was a world without landmarks. It had this in common with the twentieth century: life was an urgent struggle to make sense of what was happening." So Esther de Waal begins her first chapter in her classic book on St Benedict and perhaps thus puts her finger on the extraordinary appeal of the Rule of St Benedict in our own age, not just within the church at large but also in our increasingly secularized society.

Esther de Waal is a noted scholar of the Benedictine life and in this book she elucidates and makes very accessible the Rule of St. Benedict, as well as applying it to the spiritual lives of the baptized. In so doing she opens to us an opportunity to explore—among other things—the place of silence and stillness in busy lives and the need for a godly 'mindfulness' for our health and wellbeing. Copies of **SEEKING GOD: The Way of St.**

Benedict can be purchased at Amazon, along with both simple and more elaborate versions of the Rule itself.

In keeping with the Benedictine theme of these five Wednesdays, the Mass at 6.45PM will take on a more meditative quality, with a directed meditation in place of the usual homily, and the opportunity for silence. The author, Esther de Waal, will be at StPaul's in person on the evening of Wednesday 3rd July to talk about 'The Importance of Paradox'.


