

3 March 2013: The Third Sunday of Lent

The crooked yet straight path

Dietrich Bonhoeffer once spoke of "the crooked yet straight path of reconciliation." The phrase lept from a reflection on the story of the Good Samaritan in his book Life Together (1996). Faced with the crisis of the man lying at the side of the road, the Priest and the Levite travelled straight on, the Samaritan turned aside. But his path to the neighbour was straight to God.

That image was taken up this week in a key-note address by the new Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, at a conference in Coventry. The idea for a low-key conference emerged when Justin Welby became Bishop of Durham just over a year ago. With his translation to the See of Canterbury the initiative grew in momentum and eventually turned into a very significant gathering of Christians from around the world as the first public intiative of the new Archbishop.

Coventry – of course – was the perfect setting. Bombed in the War and with the Cathedral there

destroyed in 1940, the new and iconic Cathedral building by Basil Spence has been, since its consecration in 1962, a focus for thinking about reconciliation. Coventry is the home of The Community of the Cross of Nails, a world-wide fellowship of people from 35 countries who are committed to active engagement in reconciliation. If you haven't yet visited it, do. The old ruins of the formed building abut the new one – and where two charred timbers from the roof of the old fell to ground in the shape of a cross, an altar has been created and above it the words 'Father Forgive' have been engraved on the wall. To walk from the one former building into the other



is to walk, as it were, from Good Friday into Easter Day. It is a place that embodies the hope to which we are all called in the Gospel and which expresses the Church's task of building a kinder and more Christ-like world.

When we pray publicly for peace and reconciliation – which we do every day at St Paul's, morning and evening – I always like to include one particular phrase: "Father, that which we pray for, give us also grace and strength to work for..." It is too easy to pray for peace in a way that presupposes that reconciliation is something which is brought in far away places to warring factions by great statesmen and others who bring particular skills of patience and healing. Reconciliation is never 'brought' but only 'achieved' by those who are already in conflict: it is *their* work, which outsiders can sometimes help to support and advance. Nor is it just something to be achieved 'far away': we all need to be agents of peace and reconciliation in our daily living. At all times we need to be those willing to walk the crooked yet straight path that brings us closer to God.

Please pray for our new Archbishop. Please go to the Coventry Cathedral website and read transcripts of this week's conference. And please pray – and work – daily for reconciliation.

O God, it is your will to hold both heaven and earth in a single peace. Let the design of your great love shine on the waste of our wraths and sorrows, and give peace to your Church, peace among nations, peace in our homes and peace in our hearts.

LENT AT ST PAUL'S a season for centring


During the forty days of Lent we centre ourselves and place God at the centre of our lives. To this end a number of resources and opportunities are available:
