



## Health check...

How healthy is St Paul's Knightsbridge? And is that a meaningful or a meaningless question?

At a recent meeting, I was discussing with leaders of companies and organisations of all sorts (secular and religious) notions of 'health' – not of individuals within organisations



(whose individual flourishing and wellbeing is nonetheless an important issue for leaders, of course), but the 'health' of organisations as a whole. Is your organisation 'healthy'? Some, frankly, struggled. A metaphor too far!? Without any clear definitions of what it means to be healthy, and lacking – perhaps – the turn of mind that makes 'figurative' thinking easy or natural, some felt that to begin to talk about 'organisational health' risked being a distraction from the clear and measurable indicators of business performance they were familiar with (gross margin, profit, headcount, and so on). But others leap into the idea with enthusiasm. Sitting light to the need for clearer definitions, they knew (they 'felt' they

'sensed', they just 'knew instinctively') when things felt healthy and unhealthy — and they were ready to enumerate the signs and indicators to one another: health "is when people love to belong", "it is when everybody is 'aligned'", "it is when it feels good to be there!").

I have a pet theory (a little thing of mine own which has yet to make it into the form of a book!) that 'health' in any organisation has to do with being in that place where three overlapping and interlocking 'systems' are in harmony with each other: first, the 'mechanics' of your shared life (i.e. "do people know what to do, how to do it and when" – which is often not the case!); second, the 'people bit' (i.e. are you all clear and honest about the relationships, connections, passions and – let's be honest – enmities which are at work in the organisation); and third, the 'value bit' (i.e. are you, as an organisation living out of what you believe and hold to at a deep level?). 'Task system' – 'sentient system' – 'value system'. As I say, this will – one day – be a book, and you can all come to the book launch!

Let me be frank. I have a concern about the health of St Paul's. I think that as never before in my time here as Vicar we are clear about 'task' – and things work, pretty well, most of the time! Great team. Good systems. Clear leadership from clergy and churchwardens. And we are so (so!) much better on the human/sentient piece too (gone, by and large, are the days of sulks and tantrums, passive aggression and of fallings out being the dominating story of our life!!). And we are pretty clear on our values too – except that in this area we are not yet entirely integrating what we 'say' we believe with what we actually 'do'. This is

my concern. We speak of the generosity of God and thank him for all that he gives us (in this most prosperous place on the planet) and yet our giving back to God here from what he has give us is, in many cases, *not* generous. As an organisation we continue to fiddle at the edges of the 'giving and stewardship' question (and I'm anxiously fretting about our managing a deficit budget yet again!). More significantly, we speak about the call of Christ and the imperative of mission – and yet our focus drifts again and again onto questions about living for self, rather than living for others.

We are going to be healthier! There are two 'initiatives' on the horizon at St Paul's - and I commend them to you. You must, please, come and be part of them. The first initiative begins on Wednesday 24th July after mass at 6.45pm when we will begin a focussed conversation on mission and outreach. The question to focus our thinking: "if we ceased to exist tomorrow, who - except for ourselves - would notice we'd gone?". By the end of this initiative we will have in place a series of well-considered and profoundly practical expressions of our faith in God – so that people will look and say (not only) "wow, St Paul's Knightsbridge, beautiful place with wonderful music.." but ""wow, St Paul's Knightsbridge, beautiful place with wonderful music, and you know the work they do and support speaks more eloquently than building, music or sermons ever could about the God they believe in...". The **second intitiative** is linked, and **begins after the summer**. It is a major push on giving and stewardship. To be the healthy church we want to be, we all (all of us) need to be stepping up a gear in our financial support of the work God has given us here – and that means (in crude terms) adding at least another £50k to our existing pledged giving (and actually I should push and say we really should aim at significantly more than £50k p.a. – so that we can not just do what we are already doing, but can extend - in planned and focussed ways - our outreach and mission). How will we know we've achieved this goal? Because people will no longer look and say "...you know St Paul's, that posh church in that rich part of town...", but will say "St Paul's – you know – that place where Christians whom God has blessed with plenty give back to him and to others with a similar generosity!"

Will we then be 'fixed' and 'healthy'? Well, no. We'll need another health check then! Being healthy — whether as an individual or as an organisation — is all about constant attentiveness to a complex mix of factors and to the environment in which we seek to flourish. But we would... no, we *will* be healthier... and we will *feel* that deep in our hearts and souls.
