THE DOMESTIC CHURCH IN YOUR HOME?

Upon the recommendation of a friend I am reading a book by Diarmaid MacCulloch published last year called "Silence. A Christian History" – and if you know MacCulloch's other works, you will know that this too is a fascinating read. In one chapter on the place of silence in Orthodoxy, entitled "Orthodoxy and Hesychasm" (a word that simply means the practice silence), MacCulloch of draws wonderfully attention to complementary set of experiences that has

developed within corporate Orthodox worship: namely the liturgy itself in all its solemnity with priests and deacons going before to behind from iconastasis, the screen o f icons that separates the sanctuary from the nave in Orthodox churches, so often chanting as they move, and the icons themselves. For during the long and complicated liturgy of the Orthodox churches of the East one finds myriad of simultaneous small acts of contemplation and prayer offered

by the faithful, before icons placed on their own stands, or formally ranked amid the assemblage of icons on the iconostasis" (page 110).

MacCulloch points out that it can surely be no accident that the first flourishing of the iconosastis in church interiors in the thirteenth century was also the period when the practice of silence also flourished in Orthodoxy.

I am sure that you, like me, have observed the silent contemplation that so often accompanies the veneration of the icon by the faithful. One could here expound once more the importance of silence in our own lives as individual Christians and in our life as the gathered community here at St Paul's — and that ultimately is the thrust of the book. But it was another of MacCulloch's insights that has

struck me: "[but] crucially, each icon might equally well be found in a humble room in any household, and it could mediate the same individual devotion there: Martha of Bethany busy in her kitchen can be a theologian" (page 110).

Are we in the West, perhaps especially in this very English Church of England, in danger of relegating our practice of the Faith and our lives of prayer merely to the allotted and

compartmentalized time slot of an hour or so on a Sunday morning? Where, I wonder, is the devotion in our homes? - as individuals and families, and even, dare one ask, in our work places? - a discreet lunchtime noon prayer downloaded to our computer perhaps? 1994 screen designated by the United Nations as the Year of the Family. In welcoming this designation the late Pope John Paul II issued his "Letter to Families" where he spoke movingly of what he called

the "domestic church" – the gathered praying Christian community of the Church now dispersed as individuals and households but still the praying church as family and friends at home.

Have we in our own "sophisticated" culture lost the ancient practice of prayer, ritual, and devotion in the home, for example at meals or through acts and articles of devotion among the "two or three gathered"? And, perhaps alongside that, the loss of the practice of silence? These are both essential means by which we may allow God to enter more deeply and more "realistically" into our daily round.

Food for thought for me in any event, and perhaps for you?


