A LAUGHING MATTER?

Previewing from last night at Stratford East, THE INFIDEL is a musical based on David Badiel's hit film of the same name. It promises great show tunes and laughs from end to end. The plot? The death of his mother and the discovery in her papers of his birth certificate propels Mahmoud, a Muslim east London minicab driver, from the midst of mourning into a voyage of discovery. It reveals that he

was, in fact, adopted at birth – the first shock – but there's more: his given name at birth was Solly and he was, by birth, Jewish. Oy vav! An existential crisis unfolds. Who *is* he? What is he? And what does he need to learn about what he is not? On one (superficial) the journey level is hilarious Mahmoud as turns to the only Jew he knows for help, a clinically depressed, border-line alcoholic called Lenny, whose take on what you need to know to become

Jewish involves lessons in dancing. The superficial is easy (and very amusing!). The real fun takes place at a deeper level as Mahmoud turns from being а mildly Judeophobic Muslim into a mildly selfloathing Jew, these two identities being coloured third: Mahmud by а the commonsense secular rationalist, who senses that religio-tribal "identity" of this or any sort is comforting, but also absurd. Fun!

What will the musical be like? Well, a friend of mine, actor Andy Paul, is playing one of the characters – and so I'll find out soon! Off to the Theatre Royal in Stratford East. I'll let you know.

Part of us bristles, of course. Is this *suitable* material for a musical? In an era in which orange-suited captives kneel in desert-filmed videos and in which fear of the power of

religious fanaticism stalks the globe, can it possibly be right to laugh at this sort of stuff? Is it ever right to laugh about religion, still less laugh at it?

Aristotle, though cautious about an excess of humour, believed that laughter is what separates us from the beasts – and that a baby doesn't have a soul until the moment it laughs for the first time. He was, I think, onto something, at least in the second of those three thoughts! To be able

to laugh 'at ourselves' is redemptive as it often allows us to cut through pomposity and pretence and to get to the heart of things. To smile *with* others is to reveal creativity of thought and makes possible a creative playfulness that opens things up rather than closing them down. A little more laughter in inter-religious dialogue (and a little more laughter in the life of the Church) might allow us to see possibilities and self-evident truths currently obscured by our fearful straight-



facèdness and sometimes 'dour' religious anxiety. Fr Alan Gyle
