"The face of evil?"

Rolf Harris (84), veteran entertainer, musician and artist, has been found guilty of 12 charges of indecent assault between the 1960s and '80s. The announcement coincided with the publication, by the Metropolitan Police, of his 'mug shot' – taken at the time of his arrest. It shows the star without the benefits of makeup and stage lighting, eyes heavy and looking

weary. As an image it is far from flattering, reproduced endlessly with sensationalist headlines as 'the face of evil'.

For six decades, Rolf Harris had success as an astonishingly popular entertainer — someone who was constantly on television and variety

shows, bewildering audiences with his skill as an artist and as a musician-cumentertainer. I loved him and, as a child, sat transfixed as he took a tray of paint and a paint roller and created, on

some blank wall, an image that emerged from a few apparently random splodges of paint. "Can you see what it is yet?!" I couldn't... I couldn't... and then I could. Wonderful. He was a man of remarkable talent.

It is interesting what we do with news of the sort that emerged on Monday – and with the individuals involved, isn't it? We condemn. And we condemn *absolutely*. No shades of grey. We edit out any good there may ever have been and find it easier to see the accused as wholly, 110% evil and bad. It is called *'schizoid process'*. Around the world, politicians and public figures have rushed to condemn, *absolutely*, a man who is to be stripped of public honour. He is, we have been told, "despicable", "wicked" and a "pervert.

And — of course — wicked he has been. To corrupt and to take advantage of the vulnerable from a position of power, and especially to exploit them sexually, is to do a great harm and is to abuse a place of trust. Thank God he has been duly tried and found guilty and those involved as victims, now believed and vindicated, have the chance to

achieve closure.

It is just that he is *not* wholly evil, is he – rather that there is something in us that finds it much easier to deal in absolutes than in complexity. What of his talent. What of the skill as an entertainer and an artist?

St Paul was keen to encourage us to recognise that life is all about complexity and ambiguity. Few situations and fewer individuals are *wholly* bad or *wholly* good. Most of us are

a bundle of competing instincts, good and bad, and of mixed motivations. Writing to the Church in Rome St Paul said this: "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do" (Romans 7:19).

If Scripture is clear about this complexity, it is also clear about one other thing: the need to avoid judgement of others. Scapegoating, vilification, crude categorisation makes *us* feel better but is ultimately unchristian. "Judge not that you be not judged..." (Matthew 7:1)

So let's pray for the victims of crime, and for perpetrators of abuse, certainly. But let's also pray for ourselves: for grace to stand, for strength to allow good not evil to flourish in us, and for forgiveness from over-hasty judgement of others. *Fr Alan Gyle*


