Order of Service

THE ENTRANCE HYMN

THE GREETING

When all are in their places the Bishop says:

▲ In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

There is one body and one spirit.

There is one hope to which we were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all.

Peace be with you and with thy spirit.

THE PRAYER OF PREPARATION

Almighty God, unto whom all hearts be open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy name; through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

GLORIA IN EXCELSIS DEO

The choir sings:

THE COLLECT

The Celebrant introduces a period of silent prayer:

Let us pray.

Thereafter, he sings:

O God, who, through the preaching of the blessed apostle, Paul, hast caused the light of the gospel to shine throughout the world: grant, we beseech thee, that we, having his wonderful conversion in remembrance, may show forth our thankfulness unto thee for the same by following the holy doctrine which he taught; through Jesus Christ, thy Son, our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Amen.

The Liturgy of the Word

THE FIRST READING

The Acts of the Apostles 9: 1-22

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank. Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this

man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah.

At the end:

THE SECOND READING

St Paul's Letter to the Galatians 1: 11-16a

I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel that was proclaimed by me is not of human origin; for I did not receive it from a human source, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ.

You have heard, no doubt, of my earlier life in Judaism. I was violently persecuting the church of God and was trying to destroy it. I advanced in Judaism beyond many among my people of the same age, for I was far more zealous for the traditions of my ancestors. But when God, who had set me apart before I was born and called me through his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, so that I might proclaim him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with any human being

At the end:

All turn to face the Deacon.

THE GOSPEL READING

The Deacon says:

The Lord be with you

And with thy spirit.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ, according to Matthew. Glory be to thee, O Lord.

Peter said to Jesus: 'Look, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?' Jesus said to them, 'Truly I tell you, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man is seated on the throne of his glory, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold, and will inherit eternal life. THE SERMON

The Rt Revd Michael Colclough Bishop in Residence at St Paul's Knightsbridge and Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of London

The Rite of Confirmation & Reception

The candidates are presented with their sponsors.

The Bishop asks the candidates:

Robert & Claudio, have you been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit?

I have.

Robert, are you ready with your own mouth and from your own heart to affirm your faith in Jesus Christ?

I am.

Claudio, do you acknowledge the Church of England as part of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church? **I do.**

Claudio, do you accept the teaching, discipline and authority of the Church of England?

I do.

Robert & Claudio, will you take part with us in worship and mission? **I will.**

The Bishop addresses the whole congregation.

People of God, will you welcome Robert & Claudio and uphold them in their life in Christ?

With the help of God, we will.

THE DECISION

The Bishop addresses both the candidates.

In baptism, God calls us out of darkness into his marvellous light. To follow Christ means dying to sin and rising to new life with him. Therefore I ask:

Do you turn to Christ? I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins? **I repent of my sins.**

Do you renounce evil? I renounce evil.

The Bishop says:

May God who has given you the desire to follow Christ give you strength to continue in the Way. **Amen.**

PROFESSION OF FAITH

The Bishop addresses the congregation.

Brothers and sisters, I ask you to profess together with these candidates the faith of the Church.

Do you believe and trust in God the Father? I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe and trust in his Son Jesus Christ?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe and trust in the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Bishop sprinkles the candidates with Holy Water, then says: Almighty God, we thank you for our fellowship in the household of faith with all who have been baptized into your name. Keep us faithful to our baptism, and so make us ready for that day when the whole creation shall be made perfect in your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

CONFIRMATION

Robert Clouston kneels before the Bishop. The Bishop says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord who has made heaven and earth.

Blessed be the name of the Lord **now and for ever. Amen.**

The Bishop extends his hands towards the candidate to be confirmed and says: Almighty and ever-living God, you have given you servant new birth in baptism by water and the Spirit, and have forgiven him all his sins.

Let your Holy Spirit rest upon him: the Spirit of wisdom and understanding; the Spirit of counsel and inward strength; the Spirit of knowledge and true godliness; and let his delight be in the fear of the Lord. Amen.

Robert, God has called you by name and made you his own.

He then lays his hand on his head, saying: Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

He then anoints Robert on the crown of the head with the Oil of Chrism, saying:

Shine in the world as one of God's chosen ones, beloved and accepted in Jesus Christ our Lord.

RECEPTION

Claudio Cornini kneels before the Bishop. The Bishop says:

God of mercy and love, by one Spirit we have all been baptized into one body and made to drink of the one Spirit; we thank you for the gifts you have given to this your servant for the building up of the body of Christ.

Grant that he may continue in the life of the Spirit and walk with us in the light and obedience of Christ.

By the same Spirit, fill the whole Church with your overflowing love; give us knowledge and discernment of your will, and steadfastness in your service, until we all come to the unity of the faith, to the measure of the full stature of Christ, through whom we make our prayer.

Amen.

The Bishop takes Claudio's hand:

Claudio, we recognize you as a member of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church; and we receive you into the communion of the Church of England in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**.

The Bishop invites the congregation to pray for both candidates:

Defend, O Lord, these your servants with your heavenly grace, that they may continue yours for ever, and daily increase in your Holy Spirit more and more until they come to your everlasting kingdom. Amen.

THE PEACE

The Celebrant says:

Christ is our peace.

He has reconciled us to God in one body by the cross.

We meet in his name, and we share his peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you. and with thy spirit.

The Deacon says:

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

All exchange a sign of peace with those standing close by.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

THE OFFERTORY

The gifts of the people are carried to the altar and presented. A collection is taken. Please use the Gift Aid envelopes provided, remembering to fill in all the details.

The altar is prepared and the gifts of bread and wine, the altar, and the sanctuary party are censed.



The Celebrant sings: All respond:




The Lord be with you R and with thy spi-rit.

Communion Service 'Collegium Regale' – Herbert Howells (1892-1983)

The prayer continues:

Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through thy Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ, and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of thy Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be unto us his body and his blood; who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

Likewise after supper he took the cup; and when he had given thanks to thee, he gave it to them, saying:

Drink ye all of this; for this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me.

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of his kingdom and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ, thy Son, our Lord.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of thy divine majesty, renew us by thy Holy Spirit, inspire us with thy love, and unite us in the body of thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord,


by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be unto thee, O Father almighty, world without end. **Amen.**

THE FRACTION

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated bread, saying:

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

THE GIVING OF HOLY COMMUNION

By way of invitation to receive the Sacrament the Celebrant says:

Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof, but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

The Sacred Ministers and Servers receive the Holy Communion, followed by the people, beginning with those seated at the front of the Nave. All who normally do so in their own Church are invited to receive the Sacrament. Those who do not wish to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion are invited to approach the altar to receive a blessing, carrying this booklet in their hands as an indication to the Priest.

Collegium Regale – Herbert Howells (1892-1983)

Herbert Howells was an English composer noted for his large output of Anglican choral music and organ music. He studied at the Royal College of Music under Stanford, Parry, and Wood. Howells began by writing mostly orchestral music, before branching out to the organ with his first set of psalm preludes. His music is easily recognisable for its unique harmonic language, and seems out of place anywhere except a large English cathedral or church. This Mass was published in 1957 for the choir of King's College Cambridge.

The Spirit of the Lord – Edward Elgar (1857-1934)

This piece is an extract from 'The Apostles' - the first of two oratorios, composed by Edward Elgar in 1903. The oratorio text is compiled from a variety of biblical sources, put together by the composer. 'The Spirit of the Lord' is in fact the prologue to the oratorio, and hence introduces many of the themes and motifs that are to be heard throughout the rest of the work.

'How lovely are the messengers' from the Oratorio 'St Paul', Op. 36 - Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

This is an extract from Felix Mendelssohn's now infrequently performed oratorio 'St Paul', which tells the story of the life of St Paul - from his less than Christian beginnings, to his conversion and baptism, his missions, and eventually his persecution. The libretto was compiled from old and New Testament passages by Mendelssohn's childhood friend, Pastor Julius Schubring. The work was premiered in 1836. Mendelssohn includes settings of hymns (chorales), in the style that Bach - who's work Mendelssohn was largely responsible for rediscovering and bringing to public attention - had used in his own oratorios.

Allegro maestoso e vivace from Sonata in B flat major Op. 65, No 4 - Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

Mendelssohn, throughout his life, was particularly noted for his skill as an organist, and his playing of Bach's music in particular was always especially well received. Mendelssohn was instrumental in the rediscovery of Bach's organ music, which was largely unknown since the composer's death nearly a hundred years previously. Mendelssohn was commissioned to compose a set of organ pieces in 1844 by the English publisher Coventry and Hollier (Mendelssohn was especially popular in England, although his music was generally seen to be old fashioned). The composer eventually turned the 'set of pieces' into a set of sonatas - not sonatas in the Classical era sense (meaning 'pieces in sonata form'), but instead sonatas in the sense that Bach had used (simply a collection of varying pieces). Some of the movements were originally composed for totally unrelated purposes - such as a March composed for the wedding of the composer's sister some years earlier.
