

FIRST SUNDAY OF EPIPHANY

11th January 2015

"JE SUIS CHARLIE..."

There is only one thing to write about this weekend: Paris, Charlie Hebdo and the terrorist outrage there. *Bien sur!*

The image on *this* page, though a cartoon, is neither satyrical nor French! It is the work of an anonymous monk in a mediaeval scriptorium. It is not satyrical; on the

contrary, it is probably rather kind and flattering. It depicts one Aelred of Rievaulx. a monk, Cistercian born in Hexham, who became Abbot of Rievaulx abbey in North Yorkshire in 1147. In his day, so attuned to the spirituality of the magisterial St Bernard of Clairvaux was he, that he was known across Europe as 'the Bernard of the North'. This otherwise obscure individual is celebrated in the Church on 12th January - the

anniversary of his death in 1167 - as one of the great monastic leaders and as author of one of the great Christian classics: 'On Spiritual Friendship.' In it he writes, for those living in a monastic setting, about the disciplines that make it possible to see close, even intimate friendship as both a way of exploring relationship with God and a way of expressing commitment to being 'with God' as a faithful soul. The way we live with one another is – or can be – 'a holy thing'.

The idea that inter-personal relationship is not just a human construct but can be 'sacramental' is familiar from Scripture. The author of the Johannine epistles writes: *God is love, and those who live in love live in* God, and God lives in them... (1 John 4: 16). Abbot Aelred builds on this insight, but from the persepctive of deep acquaintance with the challenges of maintaining friendship with those with whom we live cheek-byjowel, and with whom we often disagree. His view of friendship is neither light nor fluffy! It is not easy living in a monastic

community: ask any nun or monk. Aelred brings his readers back, again and again, to the necessity of creating a real and spiritual friendship that embraces difference and lives with its challenges, seeing the work of loving those whom we may not instinctively like as part of the call to sanctification: My friend must be the quardian of our mutual love, or even of my very soul, so that... whatever he sees in it

that is flawed he will correct or endure with all his strength. When I rejoice, he will rejoice; when I grieve, he will grieve with me."

In the hours following the shooting at Charlie Hebdo there was a wave of strong feeling as across the social media and in the streets of Paris people declared 'Je suis Charlie'. To express solidarity is a good thing. But it can also be a fleeting thing, little more than an emotional knee-jerk reaction. By contrast, the invitation to foster real friendships across the divisions of difference (and even faith) with those we may not even particularly like: that is a vocation and a worthy - and godly challenge. **Fr Alan Gyle**



AN IDOL UNMASKED: A FAITH PERSPECTIVE ON MONEY by Peter Selby. Sunday 1st February 2015 (in the Wren Suite, 13:00-14:00, free and unticketed

Our society's attitude to money has become reminiscent of the



ancient religions that worshipped idols. 'It money, mammon - has encouraged us to believe that a sophisticated game of second guessing is the only sensible response to its fearful power, and that having more and more of it is the only wise ambition and the only security against a life of penury and misery. Money doesn't just talk, it rules.' Peter Selby's new book, An Idol Unmasked: Faith Perspective on Money was Α published in 2014. In this talk he will reflect on this modern phenomenon, and ask how we can be freed from the tyranny of money's power over us. Peter Selby has since 2011 been one of the Directing Team at St Paul's Institute, and was until 2007 Bishop of Worcester and Bishop to HM Prisons. His previous book, Grace and Mortgage: The Language of Debt and the Faith of the World, foreshadowed many aspects of the financial crisis of 2007/8.
