LOW SUNDAY 2015 NEW BORN CHILDREN

I'd always imagined that the name 'Quasimodo', the Hunchback in Victor Hugo's great novel The Hunchback of Notre Dame (1831), was merely a play in Latin words on the idea of man 'partly formed'... He is described by Hugo, after all, as 'hideous' and as 'a creation of the devil' – and his appearance shocked everyone. But in fact the name of the hunchback also came from the particular Sunday on which he was discovered and rescued by the Archdeacon of Notre Dame and brought up to become the Cathedral's bellringer: Quasimodo Sunday, or – as we more commonly call it 'Low Sunday'.

Why the name Quasimodo Sunday? Well, the word comes from the Latin introit for the Octave Day of

Easter and the text is drawn from the second chapter of the first epistle of Peter: "Quasi modo geniti infantes..." As newborn children (quasi modo, in this manner), crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Peter's reflection St is on the transformation that faith in Christ brings, Christ who was rejected but in whom we have come to know the fullness of God. St Peter quotes the prophet Isaiah and the Psalms to remind his readers of the ancient tradition that it is the stone rejected [by the builders] that is a new cornerstone, and that upon that

cornerstone will be built God's new temple.

As you come to him, the living Stone rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him— you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.

It is this mystery that we celebrated at Easter – that through baptism we are taken and built into a *living* temple to God's glory and as a holy presence in the world. And St Peter spells out the consequence of this transformation:

Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind.

There is encouragement in this series of metaphors, isn't there? We are those who, *like little children*, are *to be fed and who are to grow up steadily*; we are those *steadily being built* into a new Temple. These emphasise the continuous quality of transformation in Christ. We are not yet fully and completely made... and we are to be transformed steadily by love.

The great Octave of Easter now completed, we nonetheless continue in Eastertide for fifty days... fifty days of being fed by God at his altar and of being steadily transformed and built up into holiness.

God, by contrast, calls the Church away from self-obsession to healthy engagement with the world 'out there'. This coming term, we will be thinking about the move 'from the centre'.
