LINGUA FRANCA

A kind lunch invitation this past week took me south of the river and into the company of new friends. We were four, for what was a classic and simple English summer lunch in what almost passed as English summer weather! Our host was English-speaking with pretty fluent French; one of the guests was a Russian lawyer, fluent in (at least) English and

French; the third, an older French banker who spoke almost no English at all. It became clear – if we were not to be rude and exclusive – that although this lunch was a classic English experience, the

lingua franca - the one common language
that would enable conversation to take place
- would be French. Zut alors!

Although I studied French at university and was, in those days, pretty fluent, that was some thirty years ago, and my then-fluency was only achieved because of serious and intentional immersion in day-to-day French life, the reading of French newspapers and, best of all, listening on the wireless to France-Inter. More recently my trips to France have been sporadic, and as a result though the basic structure of the language and my memory of syntax and grammar has survived, I find that my active vocabulary has shrunk. In company, I find myself knowing what it is I want to say - but then stalling internally because I cannot remember the French word for this or that. And while some people simply forge ahead in a strange hybrid

language, a 'Franglais', in which missing words from the internalised French lexicon are simply replaced by their English equivalent, there is something in my ridiculous internalised perfectionism that won't let me do so. If I can't form the whole sentence before I begin, and if I can't find a sufficiently elegant circumlocution for it, I

tend to drop out and sit mute which in a company of four at lunch is inexcusibly rude!

Quietly, over an aperitif, I confessed my anxiety to the Frenchman. "Je trouve," I said,

"que je manque le vocabulaire necessaire. Je peux dire seulement les choses très simples – pas les conceptes et les idées complexes." I find that I only have words for simple things – not concepts and ideas...

He smiled kindly and wisely. "Mais, souvent," he said, "les choses simples *sont* les choses importantes." Often, it is the simple things that *are* the important things.

Ouch! He was so right. Sophistication can get in the way, can't it — and perfectionism too. There is much to be said for 'keeping it simple', for enduring inarticulacy and for permitting faltering — if, in so doing, we really encounter one another and talk simply about the real stuff of life.

THE MUSIC OF FAITH




Timothy Radcliffe OP and Andrew Carwood in conversation
