The First Sunday of Lent 14th February 2016 'Love is...'

In the Kohat District in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Pakistan this week, local officials moved to ban the observance of St Valentine's Day. Shopkeepers were forbidden to stock the red and pink heart-emblazoned cards and gifts that are almost as popular there as here. Speaking to a student group yesterday, Pakistan's President Mamnoon Hussain told his audience that it was a Western tradition and conflicted with Muslim culture.

This seems, on the face of it, a statement that is as regrettable as it is misleading. Islamic culture is as rich in its discourse about love as our Western Christian culture. Within the Quran and Sunnah there is a varied and diverse vocabulary of love with some academics estimating that there are as many as sixty different ways of talking about it, ranging from the esoterically spiritual to the basely carnal.

Perhaps what is being railed against is the cheapening of this talk and the replacement of a rich and nuanced discourse of love with something that is shallow, merely smutty. While I'm no prude, a glance at the shelves of card shops this week in London left me feeling regretful that the language of love does seem to be being impoverished. Rather than dragging us down into the smutty, the language of love can help us to ascend to the heights.

So, to redress the balance on this St Valentine's Day, here is one of the most eloquent Christian contributions to the 'language of love', by St Thomas a Kempis:

"Love is a mighty power, a great and complete good; Love alone lightens every burden, and makes the rough places smooth. It bears every hardship as though it were nothing, and renders all bitterness sweet and acceptable. The love of Jesus is noble, and inspires us to great deeds; it moves us always to desire perfection. Love aspires to high things, and is held back by nothing base. Love longs to be free, a stranger to every worldly desire, lest its inner vision become dimmed, and lest worldly self-interest hinder it or ill-fortune cast it down. Nothing is sweeter than love, nothing stronger, nothing higher, nothing wider, nothing more pleasant, nothing fuller or better in heaven or earth; for love is born of God, and can rest only in God above all created things.

Love flies, runs, leaps for joy; it is free and unrestrained. Love gives all for all, resting in One who is highest above all things, from whom every good flows and proceeds. Love does not regard the gifts, but turns to the Giver of all good gifts. Love knows no limits, but ardently transcends all bounds. Love feels no burden, takes no account of toil, attempts things beyond its strength; love sees nothing as impossible, for it feels able to achieve all things. Love therefore does great things; it is strange and effective; while he who lacks love faints and fails."

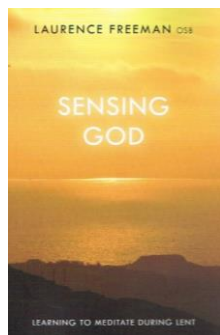
ROMANTIC MUSIC & WORDS FOR ST VALENTINE'S DAY

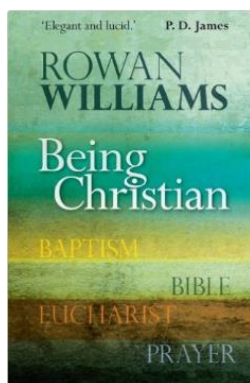


BOOKS FOR LENT
