'Tis a gift to be simple...



"It's a simple question, yes or no?!," she demanded. The trouble was, that in my view the right answer was neither. "Well, it's complex," I began... Her question was about God, and even after I'd tried to answer it, I was left reflecting. Was it really 'complex', or was it something else?

If the fast-moving age of tweets and soundbites in which we live has increased our expectations that questions will have simple answers, an age of increasing complexity guarantees nothing of the sort. Perhaps, of course, our longing for the former is a defence against the latter, but what do we mean when we say something that evades an immediate simple answer is 'complex'?

Some things in life are difficult to understand. In order to get to grips with them we need to set time aside to let our brains grasp them. But not only our brains. If certain things evade quick answers, it may be less a matter of getting our heads around the problem than our hearts: understanding often has to do with emotion as well as intellect. So, when in this context we say 'it's complex' we may simply mean 'I'm not sure you or I are prepared to set aside the time to get to grips with this.' Sometimes we need to.

Other things in life are 'complex' in the sense of being 'multi-factorial'. In order to get to grips with understanding them, we have to go further than a simple, binary cause-and-effect solution. 'A happens because of B, C, D and E' — and the relationship between them may be dynamic. When we say 'it's complex' in this context, we need to be prepared to set aside our longing for simplicity and to

be able to bear longer answers which embrace causal interdependence. This too make take time.

And by 'complex' in other situations we may mean 'nuanced.' Even if we take time to understand, and in so doing step beyond the binary and simple, we may find that the answers we come to are not absolute or even final. Ethical questions are often like this. Even after the hard work is done, what we are left with is more like an informed opinion than a prescriptive or definitive answer.

And then there is the 'mysterious.' Often the word mystery is wheeled out, lazily, as a synonym for complex and as a way of avoiding rigour of heart or mind. But categorising something as mysterious may be a way of saying that it is what some have called 'numinous' and that as such, it defies logical or categorical analysis. Instead, our human response to it is one of awe or fear. To call such things 'complex' is to misuse the term. Mysteriousness and complexity are different things.

Many of the deep questions we ask about God, the Church and human life are 'complex' in one or more than one of these senses. A Church that satisfies itself with glib, simple answers will probably be doing itself (and the world) a disservice. What is certain is that unless we are prepared to take time, to think hard, to make space for dialogue, to risk engagement and to ruminate slowly, any of the answers we give will be likely to be insufficient.

You probably know the lovely Shaker hymn 'Tis a gift to be simple. I suspect that for all the popular romanticism attached to Shaker life, what they pursued wasn't reductionist and didn't espouse intellectual lethargy or laxity. Rather they saw simplicity as a state or a condition in which it might just be possible to understand the complexity of life and to respond to its mysterious heart. Perhaps in our rapidly moving, headline assimilating age we are longing for the wrong sort of simplicity!
